




Far Horizons offers two fascinating ways to explore Türkiye. Beginning in mid-May with an exhilarating tour of East Türkiye, travel with Dr. Jennifer Tobin to explore a region brimming with historical wonders, including castles, tombs, and four UNESCO World Heritage Sites, including Göbekli Tepe, which, along with Karahan Tepe is considered among the world's earliest sacred spaces.

This region boasts an eclectic mix of towering mountains, dense forests with waterfalls, green pastures, and the stark contrast of arid deserts in the south. As a historical crossroads of Eastern and Western cultures for millennia, East Türkiye is rich in a wide array of historical remnants. Join Far Horizons and a small group of just 13 others for a 16-day adventure into this less-traveled part of Türkiye.

In late May, join Dr. Jennifer Tobin for an extraordinary 17-day archaeological sojourn in Western Türkiye that includes nine UNESCO World Heritage Sites. Enjoy an evening cruise up the Bosphorus by private vessel; view outstanding museum collections in Ankara, Burdur, Antalya, and Ephesus; and enjoy specially arranged private tours with archaeologists at several archaeological sites including some of the most important excavations in the eastern Mediterranean – Perge, Myra, and Troy.









Our tour of Wales and England takes you through picturesque landscapes to visit renowned UNESCO World Heritage Sites. Delve into the world's largest prehistoric copper mine at Great Orme, marvel at the ancient Segontium Roman Fort, and wander through the medieval grandeur of St. David's Bishop's Palace and Cathedral. Our England and Wales tours highlight the majestic Castles and Town Walls of Edward I, including Caernaryon, Conwy, Beaumaris, and Harlech.

Wales, while closely tied to Great Britain's history, boasts a unique cultural identity that we'll uncover on this Wales tour. From the Roman influence evident across the Welsh and Western English countryside, to the aweinspiring Edwardian castles of Conwy and Beaumaris, our historic England tours promise an unforgettable experience.

Our exploration delves into why Wales is home to so many castles. With the Norman advance beginning in 1066, it was under Edward I's rule that Welsh kingdoms faced significant challenges. Edward's campaigns in 1276–77 and 1282–83 aimed to integrate Wales under English dominance, resulting in the construction and restoration of numerous castles. This history comes to life as we visit some of the UK's finest castles, each a testament to a turbulent yet fascinating past.






Embark on an extraordinary 16-day journey along the Swahili Coast, where the trade winds have carried merchants, conquerors, and cultures for over a millennium. From the 8th century, when Arab and Persian traders first established settlements on the East African coast, to the arrival of the Portuguese in the 15th century, and through the era of Omani sultanates, this coastline has been a crucible of cultural exchange. Our expedition will take you from the winding alleys of Lamu, a town largely unchanged since the 18th century, to the imposing ruins of Kilwa Kisiwani, once described by Ibn Battuta as "one of the most beautiful and well-constructed cities in the world."

The location of the Swahili Coast made it a vital link in the Indian Ocean trade network, connecting the African interior with Arabia, Persia, India, and China. Gold from Zimbabwe, ivory from the Congo, and slaves from the continental interior flowed through its ports, returning with porcelain, silk, and spices. This gave rise to a unique Swahili culture, a blend of African and Asian influences reflected in everything from language and cuisine to architecture and art. Our journey explores this cultural tapestry.

As we traverse the coast from Kenya to Tanzania, we'll witness the enduring legacy of this remarkable civilization. We'll explore Lamu, where traditional dhows still ply the waters and donkeys remain the main mode of transport. In Zanzibar, we'll wander through Stone Town's labyrinth of alleys, where the air is heavy with the scent of cloves, and the shadows of the slave trade still linger. Our journey culminates in Kilwa Kisiwani, the medieval powerhouse that once controlled much of the East African gold trade. Throughout our trek, Dr. Wynne-Jones will bring to life the stories written in stone and sand, offering insights into archaeological discoveries that continue to reshape our understanding of this complex region.

Join award-winning Professor Eric Tagliacozzo and just 13 others on a very special 16-day journey that covers several of Indonesia's eastern islands. On Sulawesi visit Makassar, the center of the Bugis trading diaspora, whose black-flagged ships sailed Indonesia's seas as one of the country's most important trading minorities. Also visit Ambon, the largest city in eastern Indonesia and a jumping-off point for trips to marine ecosystems that barely have been touched by international tourism. Discover Ternate and Tidore, small volcanic islands and the well-spring for the global clove trade, which attracted European ships from half a world away during the Age of Discovery five hundred years ago.

In Bali, experience unique customs where inhabitants devote most of their waking hours performing an endless series of offerings, purifications, processions, and a plethora of other spiritual rites celebrated in elaborate temples. We will observe how this way of life is proclaimed in their diverse art forms – painting, sculpture,

woodcarving, handcrafts, and performances.

What started as an academic pursuit became a lifelong fascination with the complex interactions that shaped global commerce.

As a Professor of History at Cornell University, specializing in Southeast Asia, I've dedicated a large part of my career to unraveling the story of these remarkable islands. Our upcoming expedition will take you beyond typical tourist experiences, deep into the heart of some of Indonesia's most historically significant and least-explored regions.

Imagine standing on the volcanic islands of Ternate and Tidore, where ruined colonial forts stand as silent witnesses to centuries of global trade. 



The itinerary includes stone ship burials; charming villages created in the Middle Ages, fortress churches adorned with 800-year-old frescoes, and museums filled with fascinating artifacts from the Viking period.

But there's more! See bronze-age petroglyphs; megalithic tombs; pre-Christian labyrinths and mazes; and medieval stave churches.


Highlights include six UNESCO World Heritage Sites – Hedeby Viking Village and the defensive earthworks at Danevirke; Jelling with massive carved rune stones from the 10th century; Tanum's beguiling rock art; Gotland's captivating walled medieval town of Visby; Birka, an important Viking trading center located on an island in Sweden's Lake Mälaren, and an optional tour of Kronborg Castle, celebrated as Elsinore in Shakespeare's play Hamlet.





Join Dr. Sandweiss on his Debut Trip as our Far Horizons Study Leader!

Dan Sandweiss received his BA in Archaeology (summa cum laude) from Yale University and his MA and PhD in Anthropology from Cornell University. Since 1978, his research has focused on the coast of Peru, where he has worked on projects spanning time from the earliest inhabitants to the Inca Empire and spanning space from Ilo in the south to Talara in the north. His two main themes are ancient maritime adaptations and the prehistory of El Niño, the climatic phenomenon. He has published extensively on these and related topics in English and Spanish, in which he is fluent. Dan is the Libra Professor of Anthropology and Climate Studies at the University of Maine. Currently, he is finishing a term as President of the Society for American Archaeology and was recently elected to the National Academy of Sciences. He has led many tours to Peru and loves visiting the sites and talking about archaeology with participants.



The fabled cities of the Inka, with their towering stone walls protected by warriors in glittering golden armor, have captured our imagination for centuries. However, the Inka were only the last in a lineage of remarkable and affluent cultures that once thrived along Peru's coastal regions. The Chavin, Moche, Wari, and Chimú were among these civilizations, each contributing to the rich tapestry of ancient Peruvian history.


Our journey will take us to Peru's enthralling north coast, where recent archaeological discoveries have shed new light on these ancient cultures. We will visit Pachacamac, one of Peru's most significant pilgrimage sites, and Sipán, where archaeologists have uncovered one of the richest tombs in history. By special arrangement, the project director will welcome us to witness the sunset at Changuillo, a 2,300year-old solar observatory that has garnered international attention.

Along the way, we will explore four UNESCO World Heritage Sites, each a testament to the ingenuity and creativity of ancient empires. We will wander through Lima's historic center, a vibrant city that blends colonial architecture with modern energy. We will marvel at Caral, an ancient city believed to be the oldest in the New World, predating the Inka by millennia. We will be awed by Chan Chan, one of the largest pre-Columbian cities, with its impressive walls and intricate designs. We will traverse Qhapaq Nan, the extensive road system that connected the

Inka Empire and spanned six South

American countries.

Pachacuti Inka Yupanqui and his successor,
Topa Inka Yupanqui, the Inka Empire

central Chile to Ecuador. Surpassing even the
Roman roads in scale, this meticulously
crafted system, adorned with stone
staircases and tunnels, facilitated efficient
foot traffic. It stands today as a testament to
the engineering prowess of the ancient Inka.
Now recognized as the Qhapaq Ñan or the
Andean Road System, it proudly holds a
UNESCO World Heritage status.



Far Horizons proudly presents a truly unique 11-day tour to Berlin, Paris, and London, and Oxford with an emphasis on each city's great museums and their Silk Road collections. During the trip, we will learn about several civilizations that developed along the ancient Silk Road. Sogdiana was an ancient Iranian civilization that at different times included territory located in present-day Tajikistan and Uzbekistan. The Parthians were an Iranian dynasty that lasted for nearly five hundred years, successfully taking back territory in the Near East from first the Seleucid Greeks and then the Romans. They were followed by the Sasanians, the last Persian (Zoroastrian) Empire before the rise of Islam, who held their own against their arch-rival the Roman-Byzantine Empire to rule from 224 to 651.

Begin our explorations in Berlin, where we enjoy an immersive experience at the Pergamon Museum 3D virtual installation and a tour of the Museum of Asian Art. Fly to Paris where we will visit the National Library, The Musée Guimet, and the Louvre Museum. By train through the Chunnel, we move to London, for a day in the British Museum, including a private viewing of Sasanian artifacts not on public display. Our time in London will also include the British Library and the Victoria and Albert Museum. We end the tour with a special day at the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford.

Overnights will be in fabulous grand hotels within walking distance of these great museums, and dinners will be memorable, including an evening at the Eiffel Tower Restaurant with views over the Trocadéro.


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
ICELAND:

Sitting in a remote corner of the North Atlantic Ocean, Iceland is a mountainous island nation celebrated for its dramatic scenery. Shining black sand beaches, stunning fjords, gushing geysers, majestic volcanoes, misty waterfalls, and massive glaciers create some of the most atmospheric landscapes on the planet.

During the Early Middle Ages Norsemen traveled, traded, and established permanent colonies in many locations throughout northern Europe. As seafaring increased, either blown off course or intentionally exploring, Norsemen 'discovered' Iceland. Unlike other regions colonized by the Vikings, this new land had no indigenous population (although Irish hermit monks) were probably on the island earlier than the Norsemen). Ancient sagas describe Iceland as a rich land filled with game and fish, birch and willow woodland, and forests that stretched from highland slopes to the valleys below.

Tales of this paradise spread, and in the 9th century, Scandinavian pioneers looking to start a new life arrived in Iceland. The people who inhabit Iceland now are direct descendants of the Vikings.







The tiny, isolated Himalayan kingdoms of Ladakh and Bhutan are squeezed between the powerful countries of China and India. For centuries, their monarchs enjoyed absolute power in their mountain strongholds, venerated by their subjects as embodiments of gods, but in the 20th century, the supremacy of these domains fell. In 1947, partition left Ladakh as part of India, and in 2005, Bhutan became a constitutional monarchy.

Join Far Horizons and just 13 other guests on this 20-day journey through these two remarkable Himalayan Kingdoms. The enticing itinerary includes the remote high-altitude beauty and vibrant Tibetan Buddhist culture of Ladakh, one of the highest regions in the world, frequently called "I ittle Tibet."

From the capital of Leh, drive through dramatic scenery to view the elaborately decorated Buddhist sanctuaries, stupas, and former royal palaces found in the nearby rugged valleys and magnificent towering crags. Scattered throughout are traditional Tibetan Buddhist monasteries filled with stunning murals and Hindu shrines of the Nepali people.

In Bhutan, emerald rice paddies cascade down the hillsides, remote centuries-old monasteries cling





Centuries before the Giza pyramids of Egypt were built and long before Nero infamously fiddled while Rome burned, indigenous people of North America were constructing vast mounds. Using baskets to carry soil, clay, or stones, they shaped remarkable ceremonial and burial landscapes, mainly in the valleys of the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers.

Early archaeologists coined the term 'Mound Builders' for the ancient cultures behind these earthworks. Recent research reveals that these sites were the product of diverse cultures—such as the Woodland, Adena, Hopewell, and Mississippian—evolving over thousands of years by the fertile riverbanks.

In this region, several major centers rose to prominence. We'll focus on the most significant ones, including three UNESCO World Heritage sites: Poverty Point, Cahokia, and Hopewell. Join Dr. Timothy Pauketat, who has spent years studying Cahokia, and a select group of thirteen others on a ten-day archaeological journey to explore these captivating ancient sites.
